what is "microurbanism"?

small-scale, informal interventions often carried out by citizens.

- Emphasis on the local, small- scale or single project
- Temporary (vs. fixed, long-term) intervention
- Flexibility and/or improvisation;
- open-ended planning and adaptation
- Informal (vs. formal) practices
- Participatory decision-making processes, activism, entrepreneurialism

- temporary installations and pop-ups
- appropriating urban spaces for unintended public uses,
- establishing alternative economies.
- new practices and tools
- empowers new groups
- Experimentation
- can be realized relatively simply, quickly and cheaply
- site-specific approach to urban space that responds to local needs
- flexibility and adaptability within cities that are facing rapid political, economic, and cultural changes

What is "urban acupuncture"?

localized interventions at strategic pressure points to achieve a healing effect on the whole body "I believe that some medicinal "magic" can and should be applied to cities, as many are sick and some nearly terminal. As with the medicine needed in the interaction between doctor and patient, in urban planning it is also necessary to make the city react; to poke an area in such a way that it is able to help heal, improve, and create positive chain reactions. It is indispensable in revitalizing interventions to make the organism work in a different way."

"How big does a geographical feature have to be for it to have a name? Our analyses have made it possible to map micro-places of more than sufficient identity to deserve a name, thus breaking with the logic that a territorial event has to be big to be beautiful or worth naming. Our project has consisted in establishing a mechanism with which to measure the coast, on the basis of the creation of hexagonal timber platforms with a constant length of side based on the scale of the human body."
